Serving up Professional Development in Physical Education

Reciprocity was the name of the game when Dr. Kim Hurley (Dr. Kim) and Dr. Tam Burt (Dr. B.) visited Mr. Doug Neubauer's physical education classes in mid-October. Both Dr. Hurley and Dr. Burt work in the Department of Kinesiology at the University of Northern Iowa teaching Physical Education Teacher Education students. With support from Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) funding, and an invitation from All Saints' Catholic School, Dr. Kim and Dr. B packed up equipment and their best ideas in an effort to sharpen their K-8 teaching skills and introduce some exciting, new activities to All Saints' students.

As the Tchoukball rebound frames, NitroBalls, and Lollipop paddles were set out in the physical education classroom, students began to start asking questions and looking wide-eyed as the passed by. The youngest students (K-4) were introduced to beginning striking skills that were developmentally sequenced and led up to a mini version of pickleball. Pickleball is the fastest growing sport in America with an estimated 2.5 million "picklers" nationwide. Fifth graders learned the basics of NitroBall, or "inverted volleyball". NitroBall is a fast-moving game with many opportunities for success and strategy building. Finally, the upper grade classes (6-8) discovered the challenge of Tchoukball, pronounced (chewk-ball). Tchoukball is played internationally and requires athleticism and mental agility. The experience of new movement and physical activities fueled lots of curiosity, interest, and engagement.

Everyone involved in this professional development opportunity benefited in some way. Students got to try out some new and engaging ways to be physically active. Mr. Neubauer had the chance to collaborate with his colleagues in physical education and to reflect on his own practices. Dr. Kim and Dr. B were appreciative of the rare occasion to teach in the K-8 setting once again. They left exhausted and thrilled with a newfound appreciation for the art and science of teaching physical education. Most importantly, ESSA identifies physical education to be a part of a student's "well-rounded education" and allocates funding for professional development opportunities such as this, with the collaboration between All Saints' Catholic School and the University of Northern Iowa.
